Christine Anu headlines first ever Wik Rock concert

Famous Indigenous singer Christine Anu headlined Aurukun Shire Council's highly successful inaugural Wik Rock concert last month.

Aurukun's biggest ever community concert saw Anu headline a whole day of entertainment, including the Indigenous Hip Hop Project and a Battle of the Bands.

Anu, who has Torres Strait Islander heritage, has been nominated for an incredible 16 ARIA (Australian Recording Industry Association) awards since her first album Stylin' Up was released 20 years ago this month.

Her big break was the release of My Island Home in the 1990s, a song originally recorded by the Warumpi Band almost a decade before.

The 45-year-old is currently on a national tour to celebrate her 20 years in the music industry.

Aurukun Shire Council Mayor Dereck Walpo said he was thrilled Anu performed in this remote Far North Queensland community.

"We're absolutely delighted that someone of Christine's legendary status accepted our invitation to perform at this historic event," said Mayor Walpo.

"It was a massive day and night for everyone in Aurukun, and there was a great turn-out.

"Our community is developing and moving in the right direction all the time, and this is




Local Artist gets pride of place in Canberra

Aurukun Councillors presented OAMs by Governor of Queensland

Three Aurukun Shire Council councillors recently attended a special ceremony in Cairns, as they were presented with their prestigious Order of Australia Medals (OAMs) by the Governor of Queensland (His Excellency the Honourable Paul de Jersey) for their 'services to the Indigenous community of Cape York Peninsula'.

Cr Ada Woolla, Cr Edgar Kerindun and Cr Vera Koomeeta all received OAMs at the Novotel Cairns Oasis Resort ceremony, while two other Aurukun residents – Doris Poonkameyla and Sarah Wolmby – had also previously been awarded medals in January's initial announcement.

Aurukun Shire Council Mayor Dereck Walpo said the OAMs were special recognition for not only the recipients, but for the community of Aurukun in general.

"We are so proud of our new OAMs, and their awards are thoroughly deserved," said Mayor Walpo.

"We are a small community, so to see so many local residents receiving an OAM this year is quite incredible. "We're passionate about making our community the best it can possibly be, and I think these awards are another reflection of that.

Local Fare Scheme

From Monday 20 July, the Queensland Government Local Fare Scheme allows an airfare discount of up to \$400 for return air travel administered through participating airlines and local Councils from selected airports in Cape York and the Torres Strait.

Local residents who have lived in Aurukun for 3 or more years can receive up to \$400 off return bookings when travelling between the following airports:

Cape York to: Aurukun, Coen, Kowanyama, Lockhart River, Northern Peninsula, Pormpuraaw, Weipa and Cairns.

The scheme aims to improve the standard of

living of local residents by making air travel to neighbouring communities to access health, education and employment facilities more affordable.

To be eligible for the scheme, local Aurukun residents, who can apply at either Council or the post office, will be required to provide a letter from Aurukun Shire Council to prove they have been a resident in the community for a minimum of 3 years.

To book your return flight

Step 1: Visit your Aurukun Shire Council offices to get your Letter of Eligibility, which will be approved by the Mayor.

Step 2: Book your airfare through a local ticketing agent and present your Letter of Eligibility when making the booking.

Council Launches New Logo

Aurukun Shire Council has a new look after unveiling a brand new logo to move the community positively forward into the 21st Century.

At a Special Meeting on 8 May 2015, Aurukun Shire Council officially adopted a new logo after considering a number of possible concepts.

The logo was approved after detailed consultation with the local community and Council staff over a number of months.

Aurukun Shire Council Chief Executive Officer Bernie McCarthy said the purpose of the new logo is to replace the current outdated Council logo with a modern, corporate and professional look.



"The new logo represents all elements of the Aurukun community: symbolism to the name (waterlily), the landscape (three rivers) and Indigenous markings (dots)," said Mr McCarthy.

"The Indigenous markings represent Aurukun's five clans, and the best symbolism of this was through the use of dots.

"The colours are reflective of not only the landscape, but also the community."

The new logo will have many identification uses, including signage, uniforms, vehicles, email signatures, letterheads, advertising, souvenirs, website, and social media channels such as Facebook.

Laurie is an emerging artist at Wik and Kugu - he is a sculptor and painter. Laurie creates artwork in the style of his uncles Joe Ngallametta and Joel Ngallametta, who also created Thap yongk (Law Poles) using natural ochre on milkwood and paintings of ceremonial body paint designs with ochre on canvas.

Laurie has been named as a finalist in the Telstra Art Awards for 2015 and we wish him all the best at the awards.

THAP YONGK (Law Poles)

From a traditional point of view, law poles were produced for ceremony and left behind to the elements in the tropical rainforest. These sculptures often represented characters that featured in the Dreaming stories belonging to the community of the maker of the poles.

These milkwood sculptures represent inverted trees; the branches and leaves are hidden under the earth, while the roots stick out of the ground. The Thapa yongk enable the spirit to return to the earth.

The hidden tree branches symbolise the many Dreaming stories and laws that connect people to the land at to each other. Usually these law poles can be seen only by men, but Joe Ngallametta (Laurie Ngallametta's grandfather) gave his personal permission to display the poles in a public context.

Council Adopts 2015-16 Budget

Aurukun Shire Council's 2015/16 budget has been adopted with caution in challenging financial times.

The capital budget for 2015/2016 financial year totals \$3.788M

The highlights of Aurukun Shire Council's 2015/2016 budget are as follows:

- Council estimated it will spend \$800K in this year for Community Police, without getting any subsidies from the State, either directly or through the Police Department. Lobbying action is being taken to redress this inequity.
- In accordance with its asset management plan, Council is committed to upgrading its infrastructure assets to a higher standard, to provide better service to the community.
- Council will implement recording and reporting efficiencies, to ensure that all costs are correctly allocated to their relevant areas.
- Without the above initiatives, and progressive improvements in operating methodologies, Council's long-term sustainability forecast

indicates a continuation of operating losses over the period under review. Council is taking a proactive approach to rectify this problem.

- Council will continue to identify, and follow up, new revenue streams that will provide a net additional benefit to Aurukun Shire.
- Council has set an exciting and challenging task to complete development of our accommodation facilities.
- The fees and charges have been increased generally at 3%, with some remaining at their present level.

Finally, I thank our Corporate Services staff particularly Chief Accountant Tom Ortiz for the preparation of the budget with valuable input from Aurukun Shire Directors and the Chief Executive Officer.
