Art galleries snapped up \$60,000 worth of

work by Aurukun's Wik and Kugu Art Centre artists at the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair (CIAF)

Sculptures by the Namponan brothers — Garry, Leigh, Bevan and Lex — as well as those by David Marpoondin, Vernon Marbendinar, Bruce Bell and Kenneth Bruce Wolmby were sold. The artists attended CIAF under the guidance of carver Uncle Roderick Yunkaporta.

Garry Namponan has been carving Ku' (camp dogs) for more than a decade after being taught by his father Angus who also did bark painting. Garry's work has long been in demand at exhibitions around the country and he is proud that his younger brothers are following his artistic pursuit.

Leigh Namponan carved the largest Ku', called Brutus, which is based on one of his dogs at home "I mostly carve camp dogs because they are my totem and my grandmother's totem," he says.

New to CIAF this year were Garry's ochre and acrylic paintings, which feature the Ku' markings. "It is a technique I worked on especially for CIAF and uses body painting designs," he says.

Garry's paintings and camp dogs also featured at KickArts in Cairns with the exhibition Pich – pichan held during CIAF.

is the opening of the Wik Mungkan Indigenous Knowledge Centre (IKC) giving our community services like book lending and free WiFi that are taken for granted in urban areas.

It will also become a repository for the community's history and a centre for community discussion with the introduction of a weekly local radio broadcast. Most of all I look forward to seeing the smiles on children's faces at story time as they learn to develop a love of reading.

The PCYC sports centre is a wonderful new facility that is engaging our youth in sporting activities and giving some of our adults some fun as well with social basketball.

Events like Aurukun Day and the River to Ramp Fun Run attracted larger numbers this year demonstrating that locals are keen to come together as a community to celebrate their history and have a bit of healthy fun.

The CCTV security system is operating around the clock in Aurukun with 65 cameras in 24 locations around our community.

Peter was Ranger Operations Manager for the Torres Strait Regional Authority until recently and has worked in Weipa since 1998, with 35 years in various State Government roles including as a fisheries officer with Queensland Boating and Fisheries Patrol

"I have a very close relationship with the old rangers here in Aurukun as I was involved in their training in the early days and their work with the conservation of marine turtles at risk from ghost nets," he says.

Peter is busy working on the Council's strategy for a safer workplace and says workplace health and safety is not a one-man job, but a team effort. He now has nominations for a health and safety representative and soon will establish a health and safety committee.

"Workplace health and safety has got to be a cultural shift that comes from the ground up and the top down. People think safety, but it doesn't always translate to the workplace so we need to implement change with consultation and involvement to ensure absolute buy in.

The number of children attending the Koolkan Early Childhood Centre & Family Support Hub has tripled since Director Rebekah Farmer arrived in August.

With 22 years' experience in the field of early childhood, including 10 years working on early childhood projects in the Northern Territory and the Solomon Islands, Rebekah wants Aurukun's young children to be given the best possible start in life.

Rebekah, who is undertaking a PhD exploring the remote Indigenous experience with early childhood education in the Northern Territory, wants to empower staff, focus on team building and involve families in

"We are starting to build the capacity of service with numbers up from six to 17-20 kids a day. Our operating hours have increased so we open at 7.45am and close at 4pm to cater for working families," she says.

"It is great to see some of the families are staying and playing with their kids and we have four or five parents starting to do that now.

"We have a good team of staff who are regular and reliable and beginning to feel ownership of the centre. They are turning up on time and getting on with their

"We are working on team building and relationship development with things such as the Koolkan Fishing Club, where the staff go fishing together, and getting the staff involved in cooking at the centre, for example we all contribute to cooking a roast lunch on Fridays.

"We need to get it right here for the staff, families and communities to work towards a sustainable future for
