
Concreting will occur around the historical cairn identifying where the missionaries arrived in 1904.

scheme. Several thousand containers are collected each time with the record being 13,903 containers. This included a whopping 11,357 aluminium cans. Visit containersforchange.com.au to sign up.

The Chivaree Centre and Wo'uw Ko'alam Community Centre will not use single-use plastic cups, plates and containers once existing stocks are exhausted. This will assist with State Government plans to transition to a ban on single use plastic products from 1 July 2021.

Chivaree Centre is well known for its greenthumbed staff who grow fresh vegetables and herbs for their aged care clients, but now the centre is even greener with solar power. An additional eight solar panels have been added to the existing panels which were yet to be commissioned. While the sun is shining Aurukun Shire Council will save \$138.80 a day in electricity costs.
